Ministers Musings



I just returned from a fantastic trip to St. Louis, Missouri (of all places). The last time I got a chance to really enjoy this city was during the tail-end of the COVID-19 pandemic,

so a lot of experiences were closed, including the Gateway Arch. I got to explore the museum, which was free and great, honoring the arch as the gateway to the west, but also acknowledging that getting to that point included enslaving people, stealing land, and warfare. They also strongly acknowledged that while this was a productive place for white settlers, the Native people were completely displaced and shuffled almost entirely out of the territory where they had lived for hundreds of years before. The Dred Scott decision and the lawsuit filed by suffragette Virginia Minor happened here. Lewis and Clark with their guide Sacagawea began their mapping of the west from here. It was a sober honoring of both the good and the bad.

This time, I got to ride up to the top of the arch. The Gateway Arch was designed by Eero Saarinen, who died before it could be built. Others took over and saw the project to completion. The elevator, which was a complete marvel in engineering by Dick Bowser, was a combination of an escalator, a Ferris Wheel, and an elevator, taking the best parts of all of these and making them work together. Florence Knoll's company (Knoll, Inc.), a testament to modernism in design, was tapped for all the interiors. "It took a village..." I believe is the saying.

Like the Gateway Arch, both good and bad things have happened on the land where our Fellowship meets: people have made incredible contributions, ministers came and left their marks, and we now stand on their shoulders, continuing a legacy that they have built for us. Both pluralism and innovation at their finest. The view from the top of the arch was inspiring and spectacular. What will be the metaphoric view that we leave behind?

Children's Religious Education: Update from Colleen Hamilton, Director of RE

Dear Families and Congregants,

Pluralism is the next term expressing a Unitarian Universalist value to study this year. We'll kick off the month's theme with the simple but profound recognition that different people may see the same thing differently. Children in the Sunday morning program will compare what they each see in pictures that viewers tend to perceive in one of two ways. One common example of an optical illusion like this depicts two silhouetted profiles, according to some people, or a vase according to others (or a chalice in the eyes of a Unitarian Universalist!). We might see some things differently, but UUs tend to agree, as the proposed Article II says about pluralism, "that we are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology. . .. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect." This month and throughout the year, recognizing and respecting different perspectives is an important lesson for children as well as adults.

How can we value pluralism if we don't encounter people with various experiences? Fortunately, UUFS Religious Education will provide children and youth with special opportunities to meet new people in May. Sunnyvale Community Services offers monthly Family Nights, when children ages 4-12 with their parents are invited to help with food donations and other service projects while they hear from people who have experienced hunger or inadequate shelter. I want to recognize the UUFS Social Justice Team for maintaining a supportive relationship with SCS over many years and for bringing this family-friendly program to my attention. Children and their families will see their town through different eyes and begin to see themselves as allies and changemakers. For UUFS youth, pluralism will be our compass as we embark on a third session of Crossing Paths this month. The middle- and high-school participants in

this interfaith outreach program will study and visit another local faith group.

As our paths cross many others' this month, let's remember to greet our fellow travelers with love, curiosity, and respect.

In addition to getting updates from our teams, we will be voting on next year's budget, an



important issue to be decided at UUA General Assembly, and for Board members.

Plan to join us as our bylaws require a quorum of at least 25% of eligible voters to be present to conduct official business. The right to vote is reserved for those who have been members of this Fellowship for at least thirty days prior to the business meeting, who have made a financial contribution of record within the twelve months preceding the meeting notice (that goes out ten days before the meeting), and have attained the voting age. The voting age is sixteen years of age unless our youth have successfully completed a "UU Coming of Age Program," in which case the voting age is fourteen.
