In light of this understanding, the kids will design, build, furnish, equip, and inclusively populate "Inclusion Square" out of cardboard and paint. # **UUFS Annual Vision Budget Meeting**

The UUFS Finance team, board president, members, and staff met Saturday, 1/18 and completed a first draft budget for the upcoming fiscal year (FY2026 - July 2025 to June 2026). Using the current FY2025 budget as a basis they made changes to reflect plans for the future.

Thank you to all who participated in this work. A meeting will be scheduled in March or April to update the budget again in preparation for review by the board. The proposed budget will be presented to the congregation for approval at the May business meeting.

# Semi-Annual Congregational Business Meeting

The Business Meeting, held on January 19th, was well attended and featured reports by most of our Committees and Teams. This year's Nominating Committee was elected at the meeting. Thank you, Gary Beckstrom, Nicolle Sidovar and Debbie Timmers, for filling this important role. This Committee will recruit nominees to the Board of Trustees for election at the May meeting. The Board members are elected for a two year term beginning July 1, 2025.

There was particular interest in the generous bequest of the Frohbach family and the fund to which it was allocated, the Strategic Reserve Fund. The Governance Committee reported on changes adopted in September to the policy governing that Board designated fund. The distribution of the funds was restricted to either Fellowship owned real estate or special ministry programs. The policy states that the fund shall be used to realize strategic plans, and members expressed an interest in seeing those plans developed.
