# Children's Religious Education: Update from Colleen Hamilton, Director of RE



Dear Families and Congregants, June concludes this church year's monthly themes from the Soul Matters resource-sharing circle of UU congregations. Since September, this

series has explored "practices of our faith":

invitation, listening, repair, presence, story, inclusion, trust, joy, and imagination. *Freedom* will be the final waypost in our 2024-2025 journey together. What is the practice of freedom? The inspiring story of Opal Lee, whose lifelong activism helped Juneteenth become a federal holiday in 2021, shows us one way to practice freedom.

Juneteenth, as many more people nationwide now know, marks the day in 1865, June 19th, when Texans got news of the 1863 Emancipation Proclamation changing the legal status of enslaved people to free people. Opal Lee was born in 1926 in East Texas. She grew up celebrating Juneteenth with her family and friends, as did many Black families in her home state. When Opal was twelve, White rioters burned her family's house to the ground to discourage Blacks from buying homes in the predominantly White Fort Worth area where her family had recently purchased a home. This act of terror happened on June 19th of that year, underscoring the fact that despite the Emancipation Proclamation normally celebrated on that day, Black people were not free in many ways. Not being free to buy property and live in certain neighborhoods was just one restriction among many. Lee worked all her life to improve the lives of people who suffer most from inequities such as this. She wanted Juneteenth to become a national holiday as a reminder that a proclamation alone is not freedom. Freedom is a practice. As Opal Lee herself said, echoing other civil rights leaders, "None of us are free until we're all free. And we aren't free yet." There is no liberation until the news of injustice touches us all and we unite our efforts against it.

Religious Education at UUFS, in part, weaves together stories of many different groups of people in the past and present. I like to think we practice freedom in this small way throughout the year. Note: Readers of this column with children in their lives may want to share this picture book on the topic: Opal Lee and What It Means to Be Free: The True Story of the Grandmother of Juneteenth by Alice Faye Duncan, illustrated by Keturah A. Bobo (2022).

#### **Board Update**

The May UUFS Congregational Business Meeting was held May 18, 2025. Thank you to all for submitting reports, attending the meeting and supporting our congregation! Congratulations to Krista Gaylen, Denise Kato and Deymn Plantenberg, who were re-elected to the board. The budget for July 2025 through June 2026 was approved by the congregation. Rev. Johnnie's contract will be extended through August 2026 and increased from 50% to 57% time. This expands his role to include Office Manager as well as Minister and recognizes his valuable contributions to our community. A Strategic Reserve Fund Task Force has been established to explore how the Fellowship can best utilize the Strategic Reserve Funds.
