Children's Religious Education: Update from Colleen Hamilton, Director of RE



Dear Families and Congregants,

I confess, I'm obsessed. It all began at the 2025 UUFS marketplace. One of many secondhand books I snapped up that fateful Sunday last

June was *The Chalice and the Blade: Our History, Our Future* by Riane Eisler. The donor of this book sent me on an odyssey of newfound professional purpose that is now entering its sixth month. First, thank you for reintroducing me to this visionary thinker, whoever you are! Second, as director of religious education, I'd like to share a bit about this exciting phase in my self-education.

Back in my days as a would-be scholar of literature and culture, I was dimly aware of *The Chalice and the Blade*'s "grand synthesis," according to the flyleaf of this 1987 first edition, stretching from prehistory to the future and touching on religion, politics, family structures, and more. I also recall a whiff of intellectual snobbery in the reception of the book. It lacked original research, the critics said, and of necessity it cherry-picked evidence to support such a broad thesis about human experience. But these days, with academic ambition far behind me, I'm free to fall in love with ideas and embrace them because of what they make me feel and do, not just for what they make me think.

How has Riane Eisler so enraptured me? *The Chalice and the Blade* views cultural change not as a march of progress or an inevitable decline but as a series of systems that orient more toward partnership or more toward domination. Cultures that skew toward the partnership pole prize mutual benefit in relationships and value the capacity to support life, while those that skew toward domination function through force and value the capacity to destroy life. These patterns of relationship play out at every level of a society—between nations as well as among family members. An important premise of Eisler's many books is that

all societal relationships mirror intimate affiliations. Indeed, interpersonal dynamics form the very foundations of entire cultures.

In addition to dictating the contents of my reading shelf for many months to come (I'm now immersed in Eisler's *Tomorrow's Children: A Blueprint for Partnership Education in the 21st Century), The Chalice and the Blade*, and Eisler herself, give me hope. In a 2019 interview, she delivered this inspiring call to action:

We are in the midst of a massive regression to the domination side of the partnershipdomination social scale. . .. But it is not hopeless if we act now. . .. Those of us who want a more equitable, peaceful, and sustainable world must focus attention on the foundations on which domination systems keep rebuilding themselves: the four cornerstones of childhood, gender, economics, and story. . .. We can start with contradicting the stories that falsely claim that injustice and violence are inevitable. It is up to every one of us to change the prevailing worldview, and strengthen the movement toward partnership in all areas of our lives.

For me these past several months, the work of Rianne Eisler has renewed my belief in the power of nurturing children and supporting families, as we do here at UUFS. It has refreshed my faith in Unitarian Universalism, which is explicitly centered in love. It has awakened an even greater commitment to Our Whole Lives (OWL), the holistic sexuality education program developed by the UUA and other organizations. We have the capacity to do great work here, together. I'm honored to be a part of it.
